
Report from the Chair **BY RICK BENNETT**

Welcome to our 2023 AGM, a time to look back at our 2021-22 year, honour some of our community, and cast our eyes to the future.

2021-22 was a year of immense contrast. Immense joy and crushing disappointment.

Joy as we took to the public stage again, albeit masked, for Remembrance Day and Christmas.

Disappointment as the emergence of Omicron shut us



down again, forced concert postponements of PopCappella, and compromised our visions of VanMan and the Leonids' inaugural concert. Then more joy as we finally retook the stage, unmasked (!), for a rollicking season-ending Popcapella.

Emotional roller coasters are always tough. Ours was worsened as masks and physical distancing hampered our ability to support one another at the very moment when we most needed that support more than anything else.

Leaving Covid behind, we discovered, would not be straightforward; certainly not linear.

And yet and yet – 2021-22 was the year that proved beyond all doubt our collective resilience. Despite everything that Covid threw at us, we (ahem) rose again.

I will carry to my grave the memory of those two weeks in March 2020 when, as the world's doors were slamming shut, the board pivoted from approving a \$1 million 2020-21 program to one whose only goal was to ensure there would be a group of men who, when the plague eventually ended, would pick up the pieces and set about once again to, in the words of our Vision, engage and enrich the world through our art.

That is exactly what happened last year.



We began again to thrive on the joy of making and sharing music. Our local audiences responded by returning to our live shows. Others flocked to our digital concerts and Chor Leoni Inside – initiatives themselves born of necessity by Covid. And people from every quarter supported us financially with astonishing generosity.


If any still doubt that Chor Leoni is back, we have only to point to the extraordinary beginning to our current season, one filled with unbridled joy, love, and musical accomplishment.

Report from the Artistic Director BY ERICK LICHTE

The 2021-22 season was designed with hope at its core. After the silence of the previous season, this year was to be a triumphant return to music and live connection, including many new and forward thinking initiatives. It was designed with the idea that Covid might be behind us. This was, unfortunately, not the case. And, though live music making and concerts resumed, the Omicron surge took the choir and its PopCappella concerts off-line for a few months in the beginning of 2022. It also pushed us back to uncertain and disconnected times.



This derailment pushed half of the choir's already demanding season, into the space of three months. This period was one of the most trying and stressful times in my career. This was also the moment where the weight of fatigue from the pandemic seemed to settle on the choir and all of Vancouver. It was hard.

But as I look through the pages of this report, I am overwhelmed by two things.

First, the sheer amount of successful and boundary-pushing projects done by the choir including 26 world premieres, the launch of The Leonids, a new professional in-house ensemble built for our VanMan Festival, a new album and extraordinary online concerts and other digital content. The amount of quality offerings the choir and organization created is astonishing.

Second, what I see in the pages of this report are the smiles of the beautiful singers of Chor Leoni, the students of our MYVoice program and our ever-supportive audience. As we spent almost the whole season masked, it was these smiles that were there but were hidden. Clearly the cameras caught a disproportionate amount of these unmasked moments of joy! Seeing the pictures of the smiles Chor Leoni created last season reminds me of what this organization is about and where it draws its energy.

Through it all, Chor Leoni loved and supported each other, loved our music, loved our audience and our community. And they did it often with unseen smiles. I will be forever grateful to everyone who helped us bring music back during this trying but triumphant season.

The 2021-2022 season was a testament to the lasting endurance and impact of Chor Leoni. On behalf of all of Chor Leoni, I express my gratitude to Bruce and to all who shepherded Chor Leoni to where it is today. Seasons like this are an opportunity to remember the incredible work that brought us here.

Released in May 2022, Shanties! LIVE was recorded live at the Chan Centre for Performing Arts in February 2020 at a performance presented by Early Music Vancouver. Originally conceived when members of La Nef were hired to sing sea shanties for Ubisoft's Assassin's Creed IV: Black Flag, the 14-track album features songs of travel, adventure, and missing loved ones who are far away.

Soloists featured on the album include: Seán Dagher, voice/cittern; Nils Brown, tenor; Michiel Schrey, tenor; Clayton Kennedy, baritone; David Gossage, flutes/percussion/voice; Nelson Carter, violin/voice/percussion; and Bill Gossage, double bass/voice.

CHOIR IN RESIDENCE




The 2021-2022 season saw Chor Leoni settle in at St. Andrew's-Wesley United Church as their Choir in Residence.

It is a privilege to be part of an organization that strives to stay relevant, pursues new creative endeavors, and continues to expand. Last Spring's premiere of "Dolcissima mia Vita" heralded a new era for the group with the addition of the Leonids to the Chor Leoni family of choirs. REFLECTIONS ON BREATHE IN HOPE BY ROGER GROSE

I attended the Chor Leoni Remembrance Day Concerts in past years and hoped that one day I could sing with this remarkable choir. I was enthralled by their sound – the smooth choral blend, the full crescendos and the sweet pianissimo passages. That dream was realized last September when I auditioned for the choir and became a member of Chor Leoni. My first program with Chor Leoni was Breathe in Hope - the Remembrance Day Concerts of 2021.

What an experience! The crush of learning the music in September and October gave way to a most thrilling and powerful

musical experience at the Remembrance Day performances. Now, singing in a choir is vastly different from hearing a choir in a one-time-only concert setting. The singer has the great opportunity of learning the intricacies of the music and the added benefit of living with the text of the music during the weeks of rehearsal.

And, oh, such insightful text! Whether it was the choir affirming 'we will remember them' in the "Invocation" or hearing the story of the returning wounded soldiers in "And the Band Played Waltzing Matilda", it was stirring. Hope was expressed as the choir powerfully sang, "There is power in making for the right" and the message of peace in "Boundless and Infinite" was both soothing and comforting. There were so many phrases like these which got under my skin and persist in my mind a year later.

Remembrance Day has always been a time of reflection for me. A time to consider not only the sacrifices of those in the Great Wars but also of the many wars and injustices that continue to haunt us even today. Thanks to the music and sensitive programing of the Breathe in Hope Remembrance Day concerts, I experienced the most meaningful Remembrance Day. I definitely paused to think and remember. The music and its message has followed me since then.



YOUNG SINGERS INSPIRE AT VANMAN BY MELODIE LANGEVIN

I'll never forget my first VanMan Choral Summit experience. It was 2017, I was a brand new teacher, and several of my wonderful Tenors and Basses were singing in the North Shore MYVoice ensemble. I remember being moved to tears as the Chan Centre reverberated with the sound of hundreds of powerful voices singing together as one, and everywhere I looked I saw the kind of musical and emotional investment that had once inspired me to become a choir teacher.

All young people growing up during these uncertain and challenging times truly need experiences like MYVoice and the VanMan Choral Summit. Pandemic-related mental health concerns that have been exacerbated by our increasing reliance on screen



connectivity must be met with opportunities to form meaningful social and emotional human connections with others. Connections that allow us to be vulnerable, encourage us to express ourselves freely, and challenge us to make our diversity our strength are at the core of MYVoice. I am certain that seeing and hearing young Tenors and Basses from all walks of life be vulnerable, expressive, collaborative, and supportive in one of the most incredible musical spaces in Canada moved more than one person to tears on May 14th.



CANADIAN CHORAL COMPOSITION COMPETITION

JUNE 3 | 7:30PM St. Andrew's-Wesley United Church, Vancouver

The Canadian Choral Composition Competition (C/4) is an innovative commissioning project that puts out a call across Canada for work samples from Canadian composers of any age or stage in their careers. From these submissions, three composers are chosen and are then commissioned to write a work for Chor Leoni. The composers work collaboratively with the organization to conceive and score their works, and near the premiere, are flown to Vancouver to work intensively with the choir. The works are then presented at Chor Leoni's C/4 event, where the compositions are sung, and the audience can interact and ask questions of the composer. Ultimately, a winner is chosen by votes from a panel of judges, the Chor Leoni singers, and the live audience.



You have to know that this is the very first piece that I've ever composed for a men's choir, and it gave me a taste to write more. So that's a good thing, because it can also be the opposite. You can say "Ok I wrote -" in this case it's a men's choir but you could write a piece for flute, cello and harp and then discover - "Oh this is really not my voice." Or, "This is not a combination that suits me well as a composer". So this is something I learned here that - "Oh, ok, a men's choir is something -" I already have a few ideas for further exploration. So that's actually quite important.

Report from the Treasurer **BY MARNI JOHNSON**

2021-22 was an unexpectedly strong year for Chor Leoni financially. We had budgeted conservatively given uncertainties about audience comfort in attending live performances and the success of digital concert fundraising with the return to live events. We ended the year with a surplus of \$78,383 compared to a budgeted loss of about \$83,257 – a positive variance of \$161,640.

There were several reasons for this variance. The revenue picture was very different from the prior year; live performances brought in substantial revenue (\$261,213 before expenses) compared to \$0 the year before. Very favourable results of the Remembrance Day and Christmas programs more than offset less favourable results of the spring programs which were hampered by the impacts of Covid far more than at the start of the season.

As anticipated, government revenue at \$254,647 was down from the prior year (\$359,600) due to the reduction in COVID support; however, we did receive unbudgeted government support in the form of a final COVID relief payment and a one-time payment to support the Christmas program. This resulted in government support exceeding budget by \$74,447.


For the third year in a row, Chor Leoni received a very generous gift from the David Spencer Endowment Encouragement Fund. This year's gift was \$150,000. These monies were subsequently transferred to our MYVoice Endowment at the newly-established Chor Leoni Foundation. The amount of the gift is equally reflected in the revenues and expenses for the organization.

Through the generous support of our donors, donations at \$183,747 were \$74,766 over budget (after normalizing for the gift from the David Spencer Endowment Encouragement Fund).

The Choir also received substantial value in the amount of \$180,379 in the form of in-kind sponsorship. This amount is equally reflected in both revenues and expenses. After normalizing for the gift from the David Spencer Endowment Encouragement Fund and the in-kind sponsorships, performance revenue and government grants each accounted for almost one third of revenues. Fundraising accounted for one quarter of revenues.

On the expense side, as expected artistic and performance expenses at \$662,411 were up substantially from the prior year (\$326,978) due to the implementation of both live and digital programs.

We invested in our future sustainability by restructuring roles and increasing contract staff in marketing and community relations, and office and fundraising support; and by investing in a new ticketing and customer relationship management system.

After normalizing for the endowment fund contribution and in-kind sponsorships, almost two thirds of expenses related to performance production, education programs, music commissioning and other artistic endeavours, all in alignment with the organization's strategic plan.

Almost half of the music commissioning expenses were drawn from the Diane Loomer Commissioning Fund, exceeding the annual income received from the Chor Leoni Diane Loomer Commissioning Endowment Fund at the Vancouver Foundation. However, the internal Diane Loomer Commissioning Fund still has a very healthy balance of \$32,056 to use toward future commissions.

The choir embarked on a short local tour which depleted the touring fund. Given the capital that has been donated to date, we receive an annual income of at least \$10,000 in income from the David Spencer MYVoice Endowment Fund to help fund our MYVoice program. After incurring the expenses of the program, there is a balance of \$3,912 in our internal MYVoice Fund, the majority of which will be spent in the 2022-2023 fiscal year.

The Operating Fund ended the year with a balance of \$470,248, an increase of about \$100,000 from the prior year. This amount is approximately six months' worth of operating expenses, which is a reasonable cushion to ensure sustainability through uncertain times.

Since the outset of COVID, the Board has been viewing Chor Leoni's financial picture on a rolling two-year basis, identifying any surpluses generated in a given year to fund anticipated shortfalls in the following year. We have continued to budget conservatively and are forecasting a modest deficit of (\$11,932) for the 2022-2023 fiscal year. This will be funded by a portion of the 2021-2022 surplus.

Chor Leoni has fared extremely well through the pandemic and is in a very strong position financially. This is thanks to our many generous donors and supporters, high-performing staff team and Board, and dedicated and talented choir members. There are still many uncertainties about the future but our financial situation affords us the flexibility to weather these uncertainties with confidence.
